In this lesson, we'll activate our big muscles with some heavy work! As we push, pull, and move heavy objects, we'll engage the <u>proprioceptive sense</u>, one of the hidden senses that has a big impact on how kids learn.

This lesson invites us to try animalinspired movements that challenge us to move our heads and bodies in different positions. As we move and play, we'll activate our <u>vestibular sense</u>.

Finding strategies to stay cool when summer weather heats up is a super way to help kids keep the joy going! In this lesson, we'll play with stone pigs, frozen treasures, mud, and water to explore the sensation of temperature.



Lesson 8 Sensing Wonder In this lesson, we'll help kids discover some hidden materials left for them in their outdoor space. We'll activate a sense of wonder and explore the different ways we can play, create, and imagine.

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Lesson 9 Bubble Joy

In our final lesson, we activate multiple senses and sense the power of **joy** using a delightful play material—bubbles. What a marvelous way to end a season of sensory play and learning together!
